ENDING HUNGER, ONE BOX AT A TIME



HUNGER TASK FORCE'S MISSION PROVES THAT FIGHTING HUNGER ISN'T ONE-SIZE-FITS-ALL. WE BELIEVE EVERY PERSON HAS A RIGHT TO HEALTHY FOOD OBTAINED WITH DIGNITY—AND IT ALL STARTS WITH THE RIGHT BOX.

BADGER BOX

The Hunger Task Force Badger Box was a uniquely Wisconsin solution to hunger and a win-win for our state's agriculture and low-income families living in remote regions, rural areas and Tribal Nations. Using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, Hunger Task Force purchased foods from small- and medium-sized Wisconsin farmers and producers and delivered over 216,000 Badger Boxes across the state in 2023.



HALAL BOX

With generous support from Potawatomi Hotel & Casino's Heart of Canal Street program, Hunger Task Force customized and distributed culturally appropriate boxes for families who eat Halal foods. These "Halal boxes" – supported by Potawatomi's \$100,000 gift – were strategically provided to partners across the Hunger Task Force emergency food network who directly serve a diverse population of refugee immigrant families from all over the world.

StockBox DoorDash

Hunger Task Force delivers nearly 10,000 Stockboxes each month to low-income seniors across 29 Milwaukee zip codes. In 2023, Stockbox DoorDash—a pandemic-era innovation—continued to deliver to the front doors of local seniors with total deliveries reaching nearly 15,000 boxes this year!

SUPPORTING PARTNERS

STRENGTHENING OUR NETWORK OF FOOD PANTRIES



HUNGER TASK FORCE'S FOOD BANK OPERATIONS ARE A CRITICAL PART OF THE MISSION TO END HUNGER IN OUR COMMUNITY. AS MILWAUKEE'S ONLY FREE & LOCAL FOOD BANK, WE WORK ALONGSIDE OUR NETWORK OF FOOD PANTRIES, MEAL SITES AND SHELTERS TO SERVE FAMILIES FACING HUNGER.

In 2023, constrained by declining FoodShare benefits and a rise in grocery prices across the nation, Milwaukee County witnessed a significant rise in hunger for families, children and seniors, especially at local pantries. As the anti-hunger leader, Hunger Task Force doubled down on its mission, vowing to feed everyone with dignity and build a community where empty plates are a thing of the past.

- Delivered 9,396,106 pounds of food—valued at \$15M—absolutely free of charge.
- Provided a safety net for over 30,000 people visiting local pantries each month, as well as food resources for soup kitchens and shelters to serve over 457,000 meals.
- Invested \$694,935 in grants to purchase equipment, vans, coolers and freezers for local pantries to increase their capacity, offer the “choice model” of service and provide more healthy and culturally appropriate foods.
- Grew the network with the return of Metropolitan Baptist Church and the addition of a new shelter program at Sojourner Family Peace Center.



FOSTERING DIGNITY AND COMPASSION

CONNECTING THROUGH FOODSHARE OUTREACH

HUNGER TASK FORCE EMPOWERED TENS OF THOUSANDS OF DIVERSE FAMILIES AND SENIORS ACROSS MILWAUKEE TO CONNECT WITH THE FOODSHARE PROGRAM, ENSURING ACCESS TO HEALTHY GROCERIES AND BUILDING PATHWAYS TO A HUNGER-FREE FUTURE COMMUNITY.

Ivette Rivera Soto, a 64-year-old retired teacher's assistant living in Greenfield, knows the delicate dance of managing her budget, health and family. Cooking traditional sofrito and keeping her diabetes in check are daily priorities, but access to healthy food isn't always a given and the pandemic's economic impact made food security a precarious balancing act.

Since connecting in July of 2020, Carmen Delvalle, FoodShare Supervisor at Hunger Task Force, has helped Ivette navigate the FoodShare program and helped her receive, at the height of the pandemic, up to \$204 a month in FoodShare benefits to spend on groceries to shop with dignity.

Life took another turn when the pandemic's temporary boost in FoodShare benefits ended in March 2023. Ivette's monthly benefits dropped to a mere \$23 per month. Knowing Carmen is just a phone call away provides a sense of security and the two talk on the phone at least once a month.

Ivette's story is a testament not just to her own resilience, but to the invaluable work of the FoodShare Outreach team at Hunger Task Force. Our Advocates empower individuals like Ivette to secure the resources they need to thrive.

THINKING OUTSIDE THE PANTRY

REIMAGINING FOODSHARE, EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES



IN 2023, HUNGER TASK FORCE'S FOODSHARE OUTREACH EFFORTS BROKE THROUGH BARRIERS AND EMPOWERED COMMUNITIES STRUGGLING WITH HUNGER. BY LEADING INNOVATIVE INITIATIVES AND DEPLOYING A NETWORK OF DEDICATED, MULTILINGUAL ADVOCATES, HUNGER TASK FORCE PROVIDED ACCESS TO CRITICAL RESOURCES FOR THOUSANDS FACING HUNGER.

Through the work of the FoodShare Outreach team, thousands of individuals from under-served populations received help. FoodShare Advocates provide vital nutritional support to veterans transitioning back to civilian life, immigrants seeking cultural familiarity amidst resettlement, college students balancing education and basic need and individuals experiencing homelessness who just need a bit of help. Their compassionate approach fostered not only food access but also dignity and hope for a food-secure future.

- Hunger Task Force's FoodShare Outreach Team—that speaks over a dozen languages including English, Spanish, Hmong, Lao, Thai, Burmese, Dari, Pashto, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, Macedonian, French, Italian, Czech, Russian and French—served 30,874 people across Milwaukee County in 2023.
- Hunger Task Force's FoodShare Advocates sprang into action when the downtown welfare office was unexpectedly moved, setting up a mobile outreach unit to directly assist those impacted.



ENDING CHILDHOOD HUNGER

ENSURING HEALTHY DEVELOPMENT



ENDING CHILDHOOD HUNGER IS ONE OF HUNGER TASK FORCE'S CORE GOALS. IN 2023, HUNGER TASK FORCE PLAYED A PIVOTAL ROLE IN THE STATE, FOCUSING ON NOURISHING CHILDREN THROUGH STRATEGIC INITIATIVES, ADDRESSING NUTRITIONAL DISPARITIES AND FOSTERING HEALTHY DEVELOPMENT THROUGH ACCESSIBLE MEALS AND INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS.

SUMMER MEALS

Over 445,000 free meals were served to children at 149 sites during the summer months in Milwaukee County. Hunger Task Force brought partners together through the "Milwaukee Model" to make sure kids stayed healthy while school was out. This year's program featured the debut of "Meal Mates," a healthy to-go option, made possible through support from Kohl's, that offers kids a boost of nutrition while they play and learn.

SCHOOL MEALS

Hunger Task Force continued its statewide advocacy to make school meal programs as strong as they can be. These efforts included awareness of and enrollment work in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), which gives schools the opportunity to feed all their kids for free. A big win included the Kenosha Unified School District opting into CEP to provide over 20,000 students with access to free school meals.

NUTRITION EDUCATION

Hunger Task Force is committed to nurturing young minds throughout the year with nutrition lessons and resources provided by the Child Nutrition Educator. Hunger Task Force's Nutrition Education Program welcomed 1,450 students from K3 to 8th grade to experience the Hunger Task Force Farm and McCarty Education Kitchen for hands-on experiences. From baking healthy recipes to exploring The Farm's greenhouses, apple orchards and School Garden, Hunger Task Force made learning fun and nutritious.

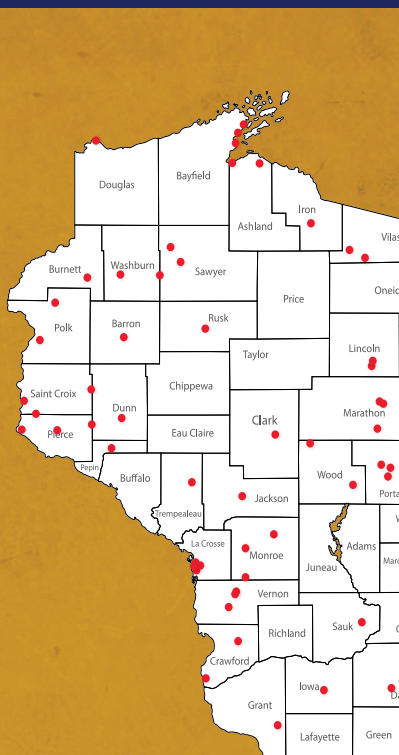
COOKING WITH CULTURE

Hunger Task Force's "Cooking with Culture" pilot program fostered cultural appreciation and healthy food choices among young learners. This multi-grade initiative, piloted in summer 2023, engaged students from the Hmong American Peace Academy. Through hands-on learning experiences at the Hunger Task Force Farm, students explored traditional Hmong dishes, cultivated cultural awareness and gained valuable knowledge about healthy eating habits.



HUNGER RELIEF FEDERATION

EXPANDING OUR STATEWIDE COLLABORATION



THE HUNGER RELIEF FEDERATION OF WISCONSIN IS A COALITION OF 131 FREE, LOCAL AND INDEPENDENT ORGANIZATIONS AND TRIBAL NATIONS WORKING TOGETHER TO KEEP WISCONSIN HUNGER-FREE. IN 2023, HUNGER TASK FORCE ADMINISTERED ARPA AND FOOD SECURITY INITIATIVE FUNDS TO BUILD INFRASTRUCTURE AND DELIVER BADGER BOXES TO STRATEGIC REGIONAL HUBS ACROSS THE STATE.

Nestled in the heart of Pepin County, the Durand Area Food Pantry has been a beacon of hope for families facing hunger since the 1980s. Led by dedicated administrator Marcia Bauer, the pantry has not only weathered the pandemic storm but also emerged stronger thanks to its membership in the Hunger Relief Federation and the transformative power of funds made possible by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) Food Security Initiative.

“The funds were a game-changer,” says Bauer. “Thanks to Hunger Task Force and support from the State, we were able to acquire a new cooler and freezer. They allow us to accept more perishable donations than ever before.” Funds also purchased a refrigerated van, which enabled the pantry to transport 50 Badger Boxes monthly from the local hub in Hudson.

The pantry’s success is further fueled by its collaboration with the Hunger Relief Federation. Bauer emphasizes, “Joining the Hunger Relief Federation in 2019 was invaluable. Their expertise and knowledge, particularly during the pandemic, were instrumental in helping us navigate challenges and serve our community effectively. They also provided a vital connection to government and policymakers, ensuring the needs of rural organizations like ours are heard.”

As the Durand Area Food Pantry looks ahead, it remains steadfast in its commitment to providing food assistance with dignity and respect. With the continued collaboration of the Hunger Relief Federation and the Hunger Task Force, coupled with the impact of DATCP investments, it will undoubtedly continue to serve families in need.

PIONEERING FARM-TO-FOOD BANK SOLUTIONS, THE HUNGER TASK FORCE FARM GREW OVER 400,000 POUNDS OF FRESH PRODUCE IN 2023. THE FARM NOT ONLY NOURISHED HUNGRY FAMILIES IN MILWAUKEE BUT ALSO FURTHER ESTABLISHED ITSELF AS A STATE LEADER IN SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE AND INNOVATIVE HUNGER RELIEF.

The 2023 growing season at the Hunger Task Force Farm brought both successes and challenges, highlighting the resilience and determination of the farm team and the generosity of the community.

A spring drought hit Wisconsin at the planting stage when crops need substantial water to establish roots. To combat the drought, our farmers worked around the clock and ran irrigation seven days a week, sometimes for up to 16 hours a day.

Despite Mother Nature's setbacks, the Hunger Task Force Farm harvested 411,000 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables for hungry families in Milwaukee.

Throughout the season, The Farm welcomed nearly 6,000 volunteers who played a vital role in seeding, planting, weeding, harvesting and washing produce for the community in need. The 2023 growing season was a testament to The Farm's resilience and the unwavering support Hunger Task Force receives from volunteers and donors.

FOSTERING HEALTH, DIGNITY AND COMMUNITY



AS WISCONSIN'S LEADING CHAMPION FOR SENIOR FOOD ACCESS, HUNGER TASK FORCE DELIVERED THOUSANDS OF BOXES OF GROCERIES AND FRESH PRODUCE TO THOUSANDS OF OLDER ADULTS ACROSS THE STATE IN 2023, FOSTERING HEALTH, DIGNITY AND COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS THROUGH ITS STOCKBOX, MOBILE MARKET AND FARMERS' MARKET PROGRAMS.

Hunger Task Force's Stockbox program provided over 118,000 boxes of healthy foods to income-eligible seniors in 2023.

Empowering healthy choices and community connections, the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program distributed nearly \$200,000 in vouchers and fresh produce to nourish 5,575 low-income seniors with fresh, local produce while supporting Wisconsin's vibrant agricultural landscape.

Bridging the gap to healthy food access, Hunger Task Force's Mobile Market crisscrossed Milwaukee County in 2023 to bring fresh produce, dairy and meat to residents in food desert communities while promoting dignity and choice through grocery store-style shopping at discounted prices. Doubling access to fresh food and dignity, the Mobile Market's 50% discount empowered communities, stretched budgets and provided the ultimate convenience for shoppers.

- Total Mobile Market shoppers: 11,402.
- 35 stops per month offering 50+ fresh and healthy foods.
- Nearly 10,000 Stockboxes distributed each month.
- Serving 32 Wisconsin counties at 162 distribution sites.



VOLUNTEER PROGRAM
